We've had several funerals in recent weeks. Were breaking out the winter uniforms to deal with the cold. We have ordered another batch of Honor Guard Challenge coins.




No big news about rentals at this time. We continue to be busy.

Partnering with our friends at Head Motor Company, we were able to collect several saddlebags worth of toys and make a \$2,000 donation the Marine Corps Reserve's Toys for Tots campaign before returning to the post for a delicious lunch and a ballroom full of vendors offering handmade Christmas gifts for sale. Huge thanks to all the Riders who participated, organized, and

Did You Know - by Paul Hobbs

Uncle Joe, Flak, B-24s and Col. Jimmy Stewart

How often do you learn about important events in someone's life only after their death? My Uncle Joe Boone's service in WWII was one of those surprises to me. In all his family's visits to our farm and all the family reunions, I never heard any mention of his WWII service. As a B-24 Liberator bomber pilot Uncle Joe flew 27 bombing missions from Italy and Africa into Germany. On their 27th mission word came over the radio that the war was over. They returned to

their base and soon home. I had no clue until he was gone of this heroic service.

Even now, I know little about his service. All I have is a photo of him and his crew and a photo of flak out his B-24 window I got from his son Ray. Another B-24 in his squadron can be seen in the flak photo. According to my cousin, flak brought one of his dad's planes down to a crash landing on a temporary steel plank runway. Ray said "the shrapnel took out their hydraulics so they couldn't get the landing gears down. They were forced to land on a runway on an island designed as a temporary landing strip for fighters. I believe it was Capri."

"Flak" is an acronym for the German word,
Flugabwehrkanone, meaning aircraft-defense cannon. Flak
was not to shoot bombers down, but to force them to drop
their bombs from a higher altitude. This reduced their
accuracy. Aircraft damaged or shot down was a bonus.
Flak guns, mainly German, 88s fired explosive shells that
created a barrier of shrapnel. The shells had timed or
proximity fuses so they would detonate in the area of the
aircraft. On explosion they scattered a cloud of steel
fragments in the flight path.


The late actor and Air Force Brigadier General Jimmy Stewart was also a B-24 Liberator pilot. Early on he was also a multi-engine flight instructor at Hobbs Air Base in New Mexico. He missions out of England from late 1943 to early 1945. In 1966 He flew one combat mission in Vietnam in a B-52 as an observer.

Jimmy Stewart was drafted in March of 1941. He was already a famous actor having done several movies including *Mr. Smith Goes to Washington* and *The Shop Around the Corner*.

He was also an accomplished private pilot, was patriotic and was determined to fly combat in

Europe. Higher ups in the military up to the President did not want this famous actor in combat and getting shot down. That would lead to much unwanted publicity. But he was determined and used various ways to convince them to assign him to combat. Higher Officers were often pressured to give him "milk runs" posing little danger.

Stewart flew 20 combat missions. Jim Myers, who served as a squadron bombardier, flew 13 combat missions with Stewart. According to Myers, Stewart's closest call was a bombing run over Stuttgart, when a fragment of a flak burst shot up between his legs, just missing him in the copilot's seat. After another mission, his plane came back with a reported 400 holes from enemy fire or flak.



Stewart was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom, Distinguished Service Medal,

Distinguished Flying Cross with Oak Leaf Cluster, the Air Medal with three Oak Leaf Clusters, the Army Commendation Medal and the Croix de Guerre with Palm from France. He became a Brigadier General in the U.S. Air Force Reserve on July 23, 1959.

It's a Wonderful Life was Stewart's first movie upon his return home from the war. Some say that a few scenes in that movie show hints of "battle fatigue" that we now call PTSD. Not many give credence to this idea. It's just great acting.

Jimmy Stewart died in 1997, never having talked much about his war experiences, like many of his generation, including my Uncle Joe Boone.
